#### 1891: W. W. Goodwin, Prof. Harvard Univ:

Another evil, one peculiar

to this country, but a most unnecessary one, is the constant interruption of study by calls of society and by a thousand other distractions which in other countries would never be allowed to break in upon study in school.

#### 1929: A Classroom Teacher:

I would not indict the intelligence of my readers by insisting that all of the interruptions I shall enumerate are likely to occur in one day. I do insist that all of them can occur in one day, that many of them do occur on many days and that we teachers are never free from the threat of any of them.

### 1948, G. E. Carrothers, Prof., Michigan Univ:

"In contrast to new German and Japanese teachers, new U.S. teachers do not receive a long-term structured apprenticeship in their profession. Once on the job, they have fewer formal and informal opportunities to discuss and share teachingrelated issues and questions. School are managed in such a way that lessons are frequently interrupted by loudspeaker announcements or visitors at the door."
